Kennebec Savings Bank Awards Three \$30,000 Catalyst Grants to Local Nonprofits

Augusta, ME – Kennebec Savings Bank recently named the Waterville Area Soup Kitchen (WASK), the Mitchell Institute, and the Augusta Teen Center as the recipients of its Catalyst Grants. The three \$30,000 gifts are designed to support creative concepts that might otherwise not be possible for the nonprofit organizations.

WASK serves low-income people of all ages who are seeking nutritious food, clothing, supplies, and a warm place to find support in a non-judgmental environment. They serve hot sit-down

meals five days a week from The Lighthouse, their facility located in downtown Waterville. Since opening in May 2022, WASK has seen a 600% increase in meal preparations. Catalyst Grant funds will be used to expand their kitchen facility so they can better meet the increasing need.

“We are honored to have been selected as this year's recipient of the KSB Catalyst Grant Award,” said Carla Caron, WASK’s board chair. “The funds will enable us to increase our cooking capacity from 300 to 500 meals per day by purchasing a new stove, an industrial potato peeler, and an industrial food processor. The soup kitchen has seen an increase in the demand for meals and has gone from serving 50-100 meals per day to 250-300 meals per day. Unfortunately, we do not see that number going down any time soon. We peel 100-120 pounds of potatoes for any given meal. This will decrease prep time and ease the burden on our volunteers.”

The mission of the Mitchell Institute is to increase the likelihood that young people from every community in Maine will aspire to, pursue, and achieve a college education. The Institute is headquartered in Portland, and a strong contingency of Mitchell Scholars attend school in Kennebec Savings Bank's service area. Recently, the Institute has seen an increase in the number of Mitchell Scholars who self-report they are coping with mental health issues. Catalyst Grant funds will be used to create a new program to help connect Mitchell Scholars with effective mental health counseling in a timely way.

"Nationally, mental health challenges are straining degree completion rates. College students are raising their hands for support but struggling to access therapy. We are deeply grateful to Kennebec Savings Bank for making possible a new program for Mitchell Scholars that will provide timely and effective online mental health counseling," said Mitchell Institute President and CEO Jared Cash.

The Augusta Teen Center, located on Water Street, serves at-risk, low-income, and low-performing teenagers grades 7-12 in the greater Augusta area. With Catalyst Grant funds, they

will create a community maker's space to equip their teens with the tools and supplies to complete carpentry projects needed by the ATC and in the broader community. The project is designed to provide additional mentorship, collaboration, and job training opportunities.

"We are so excited to partner with Kennebec Savings Bank in building a makerspace for Augusta's teens! The teens thrive in a group setting with a physical challenge to brainstorm and complete. We use team building and a consensus model to help create the best of possible outcomes. Our first project will be the creation of family-style tables to eat at together, because our teens are all about building family. We are already reaching out to other non-profits to build connections and offer our support for their own projects," said Christopher Maloney, the executive director of the Augusta Teen Center.

The mission of the Catalyst Grant program is to spark creativity and add capacity within local nonprofit organizations, leading to the betterment of the programs and services offered in Kennebec Savings Bank's service area. Grant recipients are chosen through a competitive application process by an internal selection committee comprised of employees representing different areas of the Bank. Since its inception in 2016, the Catalyst Grant program has awarded over \$400,000 to over a dozen projects.

"We are pleased to provide this funding to three nonprofits that are dedicated to serving even more people through these innovative projects, and we are proud to be the catalyst to make them possible," said Kennebec Savings Bank President & CEO Andrew Silsby.
